We sat together on the plane & struck up a conversation. As I remember it Rick reached in his pocket to pay for a drink only to find that he had left his wallet on his dresser when leaving home. I had a little extra money so I gave Rick a one hundred dollar bill. A hundred went pretty far back then. Who wants to be in Las Vegas broke? A day later Rick smilingly tracked me down & returned the hundred. He was lucky at the table. A few hours later here comes Rick to get the hundred back. A few hours later here he comes to return it. A short while later he comes to get it back. You get the pattern. Rick returned the hundred when we returned to Denver a few days later.

Rick worked at Kawasaki west at that time & went on to work at most of the dealerships in Denver. He was always a valued employee. He sold everything from Kawasaki's to Harley's and loved all bikes which is evident from his current stable. Rick, myself and several other guys sort of became a trail riding bunch meeting haphazardly at Rampart Range most weekends. Most of us had Can Am Qualifiers and a couple were top enduro riders in Colorado. Rick was quite an accomplished dirt rider. Lots of fun.

Rick was one of the earliest Norton Colorado members. I joined, as I remember, in 1985 & hosted some get together's for chili etc. in those early years as did Rick. We also both belonged to the antique motorcycle club. Believe Norton Colorado started in 1983 with Rolf Norstag providing the main organizational impetus. Rick was right there at the start and invited me.

Rick sort of became infamous for bike breakdowns on camping trips years ago. Lots of crude joke's around campfires about his woe's with Norton's & Harley's. Rick is a pretty good mechanic but seemed beset by gremlins.

Rick is known & valued for his wry and dry sense of humor. Always a odd slant on life. This has stood him in good sense dealing with the vagaries of life we all encounter.

We have taken countless rides on both street bikes and dirt bikes. I got him started on dirt bike riding and he bought one from my business. We've been hanging out, partying, and eating Mexican food together for many years. We've had wonderful conversations. Rick was like a brother to me.

When Cheryl and I got married eight years ago, Rick was my best man. During the toast Rick said, "Contrary to popular opinion, they didn't have to get married!" Everyone got a charge out of that.

Rick Black Has Gone Riding by Dennis Horgan

I received a text message from Rick's wife early, Lizette, this morning telling us all that Rick died in the VA hospital a little after 3 this morning. I saw Rick yesterday evening, and it was clear the end was approaching quickly. Funeral arrangements are not yet made, but Lizette said she would keep us informed and asked that all the Norton Club members be notified.

It's hard for me to remember that Rick was riding only a month ago, and helping me get a barn-find Kawasaki on the road. But cancer hit him quickly and he went from early symptoms to the end in only a few weeks. He had his 79th birthday in May, and was looking forward to a summer of riding. He also looked on Debby Johnson's Kawi with a lustful eye, and he was complaining about not having room in his shed for the barn-find Kawi. I told him he had first dibs on either one, and he was talking about shedding some of his current bikes so that he could have space and funds for a few new ones. Sadly, that is all now in the past. When we go, our dreams go with us.

Rick was born in Denver, and he spent his professional life in the motorcycle industry. He knew everyone. He worked for shops all over the front range, many of which are gone, although a few remain. I was always amazed at the stories he could tell about rides to Norton Conclaves and meetings, and club rides to all the far corners. And although he seemed a bit chagrined by the excesses of his youth, he would sometimes admit that the rides were fueled as much by beer as gasoline.

His memory was amazing, and even when he was sick he never gave up his love for motorbikes. On one of my visits to the hospital, only about a week before he died, he waved for me to get a pen and paper, and he proceeded to recite the valve clearances on all his bikes, a listing of the special parts and modifications that were done to many of them, and asked us to be sure his machines were sent to good homes.

There is much more to say about Rick, but I'll close now and hope that so many of you who knew Rick better than I, will share your memories and stories. For myself, I will say that Rick was both a true original and a real friend, and I will miss him.

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The Robinsons Hit the Road : Summer Travels

This summer Julie and I took 2 out of town trips. Our first was what has become our regular Midwest Loop, where we see my family in Wisconsin and drop down to see Julie's family in Indianapolis. Our second was a tour of Oregon. All together we spent 36 days on the road, logging about 6500 miles through 14 states.



This time instead of the mad dash to Wisconsin we took a detour through the Black Hills and the Badlands of South Dakota. We also rode through southern Minnesota on some very nice curvy roads. Crossing into Wisconsin through LaCrosse we went south along the Mississippi for a while until a closed road sent us on some very nice roads to get to Madison. After the family visit we went north to Manitowoc, Wisconsin. We took a ferry across Lake Michigan from there, The SS Badger. The ship was built in the early 1950's to carry trains and large construction equipment across the lake. It is coal powered, so of course, it will probably be replaced soon. Nice to let someone else do the driving. We then went to central Michigan and made our way south to Indianapolis. After a nice visit we did the mad dash home, covering 1100 miles in 2 1/2 days.

Next on our agenda was Oregon. We've been there several times so the goal was to check out some new roads as well as riding along the coast. As luck would have it we timed our trip the same time as the Pacific Northwest, and much of the country, was experiencing record breaking heat. I'm not sure how many days we rode when it was in the high 90's or over 100 degrees. The temperature reached 112 degrees at one point. Along the coast the temperatures were in the 60's so we rode west and spent a little more time there to escape the heat. Oregon offers

Old Bike Ride 19 Sunday, September 11, 2022

Open to all riders of (sufficiently) old motorcycles and all (sufficiently) old motorcycle riders Welcome to Old Bike Ride Nineteen! This annual event was begun by Bob Ohman in the early 2000s. In recent years Norton Colorado provided Bob with logistical support. Bob died September 9, 2021, but we are trying to maintain the tradition in his honor. The purpose of the Old Bike Ride is to encourage people to bring out their old motorcycles and ride them. American, British, Italian, German, Russian, Chinese, motorcycle, scooter, sidecar, concourse original or hideous mongrel, any engine capacity, we do not care as long as it's old enough. The approximately 95-mile route takes us over some of the finest motorcycling roads of the Front Range. The Old Bike Ride is open to anyone riding a motorized vehicle with less than four wheels made in 1980 or earlier.

We also honor people who refuse to quit riding just because they got old, so a rider over the age of 75 can ride whatever they want to, dammit. Except for this Extremely Important Exception: We are trying to encourage more riders of the female persuasion to get involved in vintage motorcycling. Therefore, since OBR13 and until further notice, women of any age are welcome to participate while riding (not as a passenger) a motorcycle or scooter of any age. Ladies, here's your chance to ride with a choice collection of the crustiest old motorcyclists you could ever imagine!

This is not a race. Everyone rides at their own pace and, to quote the old song, "never is heard, a discouraging word" about the mechanical preparation of one's machine or one's rate of forward progress, cornering abilities, or navigational skills (no one could be worse than Jerry Pokorny). We'd really, truly like you to join us. In honor of Paul Swenson, departed Sidehacker Extraordinaire we also open the OBR to anyone of any age riding a sidecar of any age.

As in recent runnings of the Old Bike Ride, the special decals commemorating this event will not be issued until the lunch stop.

Location and Start Time

The ride will start from the same location in downtown Golden as recent years: the large parking lot behind the old Foss Drugstore, one block west of Washington Ave on 13th Street. Maps will be distributed to qualifying riders starting at 8:00 AM. Rider's Meeting at 9:15. The ride will start at 9:30 sharp.

Breakfast, Lunch, and Beer

There are multiple coffee/dining establishments within one block of the parking lot, all of which will be open by 7:30 at the latest on Sunday: Cafe 13, a coffee/pastry shop facing the parking lot at 1301 Arapahoe St. The Table Mountain Grill & Cantina, full-service restaurant around the corner at 1310 Washington St. Higher Grounds, at the corner of Washington St and 14th St, the best coffee shop in the area, a short block away but worth the walk. The Golden Diner, a couple blocks away at 700 12th St., but the best breakfast joint in town. What a surprise, a Starbucks!, at the intersection of Washington and 13th. The Route The route for OBR19 is likely to be pretty similar to recent years. Maps and directions will be handed out at the rider's meeting. In any case there will be several dining options at the lunch stop so that you can select the establishment that best meets your fiscal and dietary needs. The ride will end at the Golden Golden City Brewery beer garden, about one block from where we begin. You're responsible for paying for your own food and drink. We expect to arrive back in Golden around 2 PM.
