Ol' Blue Hits the Road Again, Part 2

Here are some notes on the restoration of the Dunstall Commando I got from Bob Ohman. A lot of fiberglass work was done to restore the original Dunstall pieces that were broken in the crash. The dashboard was rebuilt with aluminum glassed in to reinforce it and the broken side section was built up.



The tank was cracked, and it was repaired and Caswell coated on the inside. I have had no leaks at all, but I only will use non-ethanol gas in this tank. I painted all the fiberglass, matching the original blue. The seat was broken, but repaired nicely and I had a new seat cover made.



The Borrani rims were polished and respoked on refurbished hubs. The transmission and engine were completely torn down and new bearings, seals, and gaskets were utilized. This Commando went directly from the Norton factory to Paul Dunstall's shop. Upon taking the motor apart, I found it had a "big valve" head, which was a Dunstall modification. Jim Comstock did a valve job with the original guides and valves, which would have been diffucit to replace. My thought is that this bike came out of Dunstall's shop with an 810cc kit and the big valve head. Jim says that the aluminum cylinders with steel liners did not hold up well, with the threads always stripping out. I am guessing that the cylinder was replaced with a stock 750 cylinder, which is what I found on this bike. These Dunstall modified heads had the chambers opened up, so with the stock cylinder in place, I used high compression pistons from JE pistons that Jim had in his stash. This was to get the compression more up to normal. I put in a new cam from Webcam.





This Commando came with Dunstall's 2 into 1 into 2 "Power Street Exhaust System" and Patented Decibel mufflers. The originals were refurbished as much as possible and rechromed. I built all new stainless steel internal baffles to replace the rusted out ones. The twin Dunstall front brake was a challenge, but I found O-rings that would work and fabricated new pads from a sheet of brake material. They only leak a small amount.



Bob Ohman said this bike ran very strong, and with the new pistons and cam it is running as good as ever I hope. Bob saw the bike when it was about 90% done, before he passed away. Ol' Blue did 97 mph on my dyno (which is harder than real life) and showed 49 hp at the rear wheel. Time to get some road miles on it now.

Temptation

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SMALL BIKE, BIG ADVENTURE by Bob Herman

In late August, several intrepid Norton Coloradans joined a gaggle of riders from hither and yon and embarked on SBBA 2023 - a bit of a "Cannonball Run - Lite" 6-day tour covering some 850 miles of the best paved roads in southwestern Colorado.

Craig Terry, Jonathan Chaikin, Frank Puckett, Robin Webster and I represented our club in typical fashion.

Organized and shepherded by Ben Foster and Todd Wallis, the tour was offered to adventurous riders on motorcycles no newer than 1972 and of no larger capacity than 350cc. Among the bikes on tour were Benellis, Motobis, Ducatis, Hondas, no fewer than SIX Puch Twingles, one Bultaco, a Suzuki X-6 Hustler, a Moto Morini 3-1/2 and Robin's beautiful, freshly built Aermacchi.



The adventure began and ended in Palisade, just east of Grand Junction, with the route cresting a number of high passes - Lizard Head, McClure, Wolf Creek - and included an overnight on Mesa Verde.



Since our route passed through Dolores, there was nothing for it but that we must detour to both Colorado Norton Works and Sam Manganaro's Vincentworks shop on our way through. For those of us who live in southern Colorado and frequent those august establishments, it was a chance to visit old friends. To the outlanders, of course, it was a rare, perhaps once in a lifetime opportunity to be immersed in the rarified world of moto exotica, Colorado style.

Ben and Todd did a great job, with a cadre of support workers - no fewer than three SAG vehicles

carrying luggage, tools, water and snacks, spares even a couple of spare motorcycles - and a designated mechanic to lend a hand as needed when a rider's mount suffered an indignity of one sort or another.






A fine whisky tasting on the first night out, repartee and relaxation in our sundry destinations and finally, an afternoon banquet on our return to Palisade were icing on the cake.


